Goose Rantings...

Leadership has sometimes been described as taking people to a place that they would not normally go to on their own. Once a sound strategic planning process has determined what that place should be it is the leader's prime and fundamental responsibility to assure that the full resources of the organization are effectively brought to bear to achieve that destination.

An effective planning process will systematically examine its assumptions about the future and its current and required competencies. It will then bring the management team to consensus on a future course and direction. The output should be a vision: a realistic, credible and attractive future. An effective planning process will also be participative in nature. A team of people will provide input from different functional and personality perspectives and their participation will create the buy-in necessary for successful implementation. But at the end of the day it is the organization's leader who has to be the chief steward of the vision. It is he or she who has to be obsessed with the desired outcome.

Communication

Believing in the vision, regardless of how passionately is not enough. A leader must be able to communicate the vision frequently and effectively.

They need to be capable of articulating it in different ways to different constituencies. Great communication is the ability to take something complicated and making it simple. A comparison between ex-Presidents Jimmy

Carter and Ronald Reagan is appropriate. Many believe that Carter was one of the most intelligent and best-informed Presidents. Yet he is not thought to have been an effective leader because he was not skillful in communicating his vision. Reagan, on the other hand, while generally uninvolved in the details was considered to be a most inspiring leader due to his mastery at conveying vision in a way people could understand.

A leader can never assume that the vision is fully understood by all. They need to be almost "missionary" in style as they continually and consistently "preach the gospel" of the future. Doing

so will allow them to change the perception of people as to what is important for them and the organization.

Commitment

A leader's persistent repetition and consistency is what ultimately creates a fully aligned culture. Calvin Coolidge expressed the importance of persistence:

"Nothing in the world can take the place of persistence. Talent will not; nothing is more common than unsuccessful men with great talent. Genius will not; unrewarded genius is almost a proverb. Education will not; the world is full of educated derelicts. Persistence and determination alone are omnipotent."

Leaders need to be unshaken in their belief that what they are doing is the right thing to do. This requires a certain degree of mental toughness. Being "tough" is many times misinterpreted. Dwight D. Eisenhower said: "You do not lead by hitting people over the head - that's assault not leadership."

Being tough is standing true to your beliefs regardless of challenges and setbacks or when others doubt you or your ability to succeed. This type of "toughness" is called commitment and good leaders must have it. True "toughness" is going over the hill without knowing what is on the other side. It is about staying the course through adversity. Whatever course you decide on there is always someone to tell you that you are wrong. There will always be difficulties that come up that will tempt you to doubt yourself and believe the critics are right. It takes tremendous courage to map out a course and direction and see it through.

Commitment through words alone is not enough. People in any organization are "professional boss watchers". They will ultimately mimic the behaviors of Leaders in those organizations. As they observe you as the leader, they will be acutely aware of:

How you make and honor your commitments

What you say in formal and especially informal settings

What you express interest in and ask questions about

Where you go and with whom you spend time

How and when you act/ who you consult with

How you organize your staff and physical surroundings

Along with passion and enthusiasm the leader must show commitment by their actions. Commitment is visibly shown by your calendar. For example, creating a total quality culture might be a critical part of your vision. If so, then you should be an active participant in some of the quality team meetings. You should be seen improving your own education on quality by attending classes. A good "gut check" to see how you are showing commitment is to review your calendar and see if the time you spend is consistent with the most critical elements of your vision.

Management

"What people say, what people do and what people say they do are entirely different things." -Margaret Mead

A leader must be on top of things. A leader must be an expert in the details of how the vision is being implemented. This does not mean that they should micro manage. It means knowing enough to ask great and specific questions of people. It involves the skill to do this in a way that lets people know you are on top of things and you take an interest in what they are doing but you are not infringing on their responsibilities or implying that you feel they are incapable.

Being an expert in the details also means knowing enough to hone your intuitive sense so that when you have to play "King Solomon" in deciding on a final choice among many alternatives, you can do it effectively. The leader must hold people accountable yet give them the appropriate authority. Being knowledgeable is critical in effectively doing this. Leadership is a transaction between leaders and followers. Both have to effectively coexist. Leaders must pay attention as well as capture it.

While leadership is about the motivation and inspiration of people, a leader still has to invoke many of the same skills that make for an effective manager.

Among these are a strong sense of focus

and personal discipline and skills in delegation and creating a high degree of accountability. While the leader can and should immerse themselves in the path toward their organization's future, it is obvious that success cannot come without the well-orchestrated efforts of the entire organization. This coordinated effort is at the very heart of management's mission and the leader needs to hold people accountable for its effective implementation.

Deploying Yourself

A strong leader will be acutely aware of their own skills inventory and will display a visible commitment to selfdevelopment. The effective leader will:

Recognize their strengths and compensate for their weaknesses. Nurture additional skills through formal self-improvement. Understand the fit between their strengths and weaknesses and the organization's needs. The effective leader will become a role model in fostering learning organization by encouraging and rewarding professional development. Their primary focus will be on people rather than systems or structure.

Leadership Learned

One of the greatest myths in management is that leaders are born and not made. While specific characteristics of some leaders such as charisma might be considered part of a person's personality, most of the capacities and competencies of leadership can in fact be learned. The following summarizes some of the most critical skills and attributes that you can learn:

Developing professional expertise Sharpening your communications skills Cultivating enthusiasm Keeping an open mind Paying attention to accomplishment Being accessible Being respectful of your staff

The above article by Barry Wolfson, VP of the Center of Simplified Strategic Planning, Inc. reminds me very much of GWRRA. The vision statement of GWRRA is "Friends for Fun, Safety and Knowledge". It is the leaders responsibility at every level of GWRRA to make

this vision statement a reality for the members. The tools are there - Rider Education, Leadership Training and the membership itself. An effective leader will use these tools to accomplish the goals of the organization. Each of the numerous leaders within GWRRA from Chapter Directors and their staff to District and Regional leaders should evaluate their roles in support of meeting the needs and ishes of the members looking to the future.



From The District Educators



We have several new Chapter Educators that I wish to introduce. Rich and June Reynolds-Chapter B, Dan and Bridget Kenny-Chapter I, and Clarke Sewell-Chapter L. Please welcome them and say thank you for stepping up.

Thank you to Dan Kenny who generously made and kindly donated hundreds of

stainless steel kickstand plates to be given away at Winterthing. There were some left and I will give them away at chapter visits over the next month or two. If you didn't get one, please ask.

Our District has pledged to clarify the measurement criteria for the all the competitive plaques available to the chapters. For the Rider Educators we give an Education Award for the Year. Some misunderstandings have risen

over the years as to how this plaque was awarded. The award is available to all Rider Educators and we wish to make it available for all to win.

Defining the measurements and providing everyone the criteria will remove the misunderstandings often equated with such awards. With an understanding

of how the plaque may be obtained, having knowledge of the points available to all, and how they are appointed will eliminate the misunderstandings of the past. We wish to make it a fair competition for all Chapter Rider Educators.

Award Criteria:

- · Monthly Rider Education Report ----10 points possible per month
 Every Chapter Educator signed a
 M.O.U. stating that they would provide
 a
 monthly report of the education provided
 to their members. I am sending a
 revised form and instructions for its use
 to all educators with this
 newsletter. It is very simple to use.
- · Monthly Training Activity ------see discussion below
 The revised form adds the length of training provided (i.e. 10 minute talk at gathering) and the number of people the talk was presented to (number of chapter members and number of visitors).

Each monthly report will give the length of time for training and number of members present, which will be used to determine the average monthly training hours. If your chapter has 20 members, on the monthly report you give a 10 minute talk to 10 members, the average time is 10 attendees divided by 20 chapter members times 10 minutes = 5 points average training for the month to the membership. If during the month, 5 members went to CPR training for 2 hours, the average monthly training for this would be 5 attendees divided by 20 chapter members times 120 minutes = 30 points. Tofor that month would be 30 plus the 5 from the talk plus the 10 for

Let's take an example of a chapter that

reporting = 45 points for this month.

only has 4 members and compare it to the 20 members chapter. If they had 4 members at the gathering for a 10 minute talk, 4 divided by 4 times 10 = 10. And, 2 members went to CPR for 2 hours, 2 divided by 4 times 120 = 60. Total for that month would be 60 plus the 10 for the talk, the educator would get 70 points for the month.

The number of points obtained is based on the number of members attending out of the accountable membership, types of training given, and how much training – it doesn't depend on size of chapter.

- · GWRRA Rider Education Program Chapter Participation ---Points awarded via formula

Of course each chapter has a different number of members. In order to make the number of REP participants in each chapter an equitable measurement, we need to do an averaging in the chapter. We also want to take into account those members who advance in the program. What I have come up with is two measurements. The first is the number of participants in the program divided by the chapter membership number times 100. Then for each participant who advances you get additional points based on the formula -number who advanced divided by the number of members participating in REP times 100.

Lets take X and Z again and see how this works. In X we have 10 members who participate in REP. They are all at level I so chapter X gets 10 members participating divided by 20 members in the chapter times 100 = 50 points. Then this month they also had 3 move up to Level II so they get 3 members advancing divided by 10 participants in REP giving them an additional 30 points. Chapter X's total for the month is 80 points. In Chapter Z, we have 3 members in REP so they get: 3 members participating divided by 4

members in the chapter times 100 = 75 points. None of them advanced this month so Chapter Z gets only 75 points.

Again, the size of the chapter doesn't have anything to do with the amount of points a chapter can obtain. What does count? Getting members involved in training, presenting them with more training and reporting it monthly. I hope everyone sees this as a benefit over what may have happened in the past. I see it as a benefit to our members. The Chapter educator who works at getting their members to participate will get the best scores, regardless of the size of the chapter. Thus the award will go to the educator who gets more of his members trained. Each month in the Rider Education Newsletter.

I will post the points total for each chapter. At the end of the year (November), the Educator with the most chapter points will have the plaque. As you can see, it only takes a little effort to really have great results. Good Luck!

If you have any suggestions for improving this measurement system or award method, please let me know. We plan to use this system for your reports for February. I previously sent a form to be used for the report, if you didn't receive one please let me know. If your chapter opts out of participating for the award that is all right, but just remember it is still the responsibility of the Chapter Director to ensure his Chapter Educator files a report each month. I will be sending out a little reminder for those who haven't submitted by the end of each month, to remind you that I need them by the 3rd for the previous month.

So far we have these reports for February: A, B, C & F. Keep up the good work everyone!

From The District Ambassadors



Which Insurance is Best For You?

As spring approaches, I always look forward to getting my motorcycle insurance policy statement and seeing how much my premium has decreased (*NOT!!*). It rates right up there with seeing the Dentist or having a prostate exam. But as we all know, insurance is required to license a motor vehicle in the State of Maryland. Let us start by looking at what coverage is required by law —

- 1. Liability insurance pays damages that are caused by you and suffered by the other party for personal injury, death, or property damage. You must carry a minimum of \$20,000 for bodily injury per person, \$40,000 for bodily injury for two or more people, and \$15,000 for property damage. The policy will pay up to the limits listed in your policy. Coverage above the minimum is available from your insurance company or agent.
- 2. Uninsured motorist coverage pays damages, after any applicable deductible, which are caused by an uninsured motorist and suffered by you. It provides protection when an uninsured driver, who is at fault, injures you or another covered individual. You must carry a minimum of \$20,000 for bodily injury per person, \$40,000 for bodily injury or two or more people, and \$15,000 for property damage.
- 3. Personal Injury Protection (PIP) coverage provides benefits for medical, hospital and disability up to \$2,500 for all reasonable expenses arising out of an accident. Note: Full PIP provides benefits for you, any member of your family, and any non-family occupant of your vehicle. You may also choose limited PIP, which excludes benefits for you and members of your family age 16 and over. This alternative costs less and should be considered if you already have medical and hospitalization insurance.

Policy options include comprehensive and collision coverage, if there is no lien on the vehicle. Comprehensive insurance provides protection against vehicle theft or physical damage not caused by a collision. Collision insurance mean physical damage to your covered vehicle caused by an impact with another vehicle or object. This coverage pays the lesser of the cost of repair or actual cash value (replacement cost less depreciation) of your vehicle. Remember deductible amounts apply first. Other than Collision coverage handles damages arising from falling objects, fire, theft, hail, glass breakage, contact with animals, etc. This coverage usually has a lower deductible than Collision coverage.

Another <u>option</u> is **Medical Payments Coverage**, which pays for reasonable and necessary medical and funeral expenses due to a vehicle auto accident. Individuals covered under this coverage include

- You or any family member occupying any auto, or as a pedestrian when struck by a motor vehicle
- Any other person while occupying your covered vehicle or any vehicle (private passenger auto or trailer) driven by you or a family member

Underinsured motorist coverage is an **option** similar to uninsured motorist coverage, except it applies when the other party has lower coverage limits than you do and damages exceed the other party's limits.

The Insurance Information Institute advises there are many factors that play a role in determining what your insurance costs will be, such as being a graduate of a rider-training course, your age, your driving record, where you live and the type of motorcycle you own. They make the following suggestions to keep the costs down:

Many companies offer discounts from 10 to 15 percent on motorcycle insurance for graduates of training courses, such as the Motorcycle Safety Foundation (MSF) rider course.

Riders under the age of 25, usually considered a higher risk, may see some savings by taking this course. It's also a good idea for cyclists who have already had accidents.

- Maintaining a good driving record with no violations will also help reduce your premiums.
- In many northern states, riders may save money by buying a "lay-up" policy. With a lay-up policy, all coverage except comprehensive is suspended during winter months.
- Find out what discounts your insurance representative offers. Multibike discounts for those insuring more than one bike; organization discounts, if you're a member of a motorcycle association; and mature rider discounts for experienced riders, are just a few possibilities. Discounts can range anywhere from 10% to 20%, depending on the company and your state. Availability and qualifications for discounts vary from company to company and state to state.
- Keep in mind that the type, style (such as a sports bike vs. a cruiser), age of the motorcycle, number of miles you drive a year and where you store your bike may also affect how much you pay for your premium.

Choose the agent or company that's right for you. If you already have car insurance, contact your insurer. Otherwise, ask friends, relatives, and co-workers where they bought their car or motorcycle insurance. Your local cycle shop may also have a company they refer customers to. Also check local motorcycle magazines or newspapers for insurance

Let me suggest the following thoughts prior to making a change –

- Before buying a motorcycle, ask about the cost of insurance.
- Maintain a clean driving record.
- Shop around. Get at least 3 estimates before committing.
- Keep your coverage current. Check with your agent at least once a year to make sure that your policy provides adequate coverage.
- Pay your premium even if you disagree with your insurance company, and then pursue your disagreement.
 Failure to make premium payments may cause cancellation of your policy.
- Pay your premium in full and pay before the due date to avoid the risk of cancellation. THERE IS NO GRACE PERIOD. Keep payment receipts or cancelled checks in a safe place.
- Ride as if your life depended on it.

Rider Education

This month's contribution is noticeably larger than normal and it is no mistake. The snow is starting to melt away and cabin fever is making many restless enough to venture out for the first ride of the year. We simply didn't want to miss this opportunity to help folks plan for the upcoming year for Rider Education before we all get heavily into the 2003 riding season.

<u>Communicate – Communicate – Communicate ...</u>

Is the message getting all the way to the Chapter Directors and Educators? Whether it is National, Regional, or Education news, we need to be a conduit of information to the Chapter participant – not an impassible filter.

At the same time. originators of a message should not assume that their information is making it all the way to the Member – check to make sure!

How do I do that? -

Here are a few ideas. (Can you think of any more?!) Forward the appropriate information directly to the Chapter or participants. Make sure that each person knows how to access the National, Regional, or Rider Education newsletter if they have a computer (or a friend with one).

You can also include a bulleted list of topics from the newsletter or message so they can ask for more information.

Paraphrase an article and include it in your District or Chapter newsletter.

Add a discussion of the article in your agenda to discuss at a Chapter or District function.

Educator of the Year Nominations **Due March 20**th

This will be the last reminder before the time runs out. We were one of the few Regions that had *Chapter* Educators represented last year and it was great.

Please send us a write up that explains why they deserve your praise. We will be selecting the best of these for submission for GWRRA Educator of the Year and Merit awards.

Last month we received no submissions – surely there is someone deserving of your praise!

We have sent out helpful information on what the criteria are for selection plus a sample of a winning submission form last year to all Districts.

District Directors – show your support for your District Educators by Nominating them. Chapter Directors or District Educators – nominate a deserving Chapter Educator. Remember our lesson on positive feedback at the opening of the Region Staff meeting last November? – It is time to show actions speak louder than words. Let your Educators know you care!

Northeast Region / DE District Rally Rider Ed Training

Interested in advancing your skills or moving up in the Rider Education Program? We can take you all the way to Level III as a Rider or a Co-Rider at the Rally if you need any of the following. So far we are planning on Co-Rider and Road Captain

seminars, plus Medic First Aid CPR, and a Trike or Trailering riding course.

First Aid Kits

After giving [NY District Educator] Dick Norton a first aid kit and giving another one away at the District [Staff] meeting, there was quite an interest shown for the kit I put together. So here it is once again.

If you are carrying a first aid kit on your Gold Wing, congratulations. If you are not, please take this time to reconsider. Next, ask yourself if the over the counter kit you buy will do the job in a motorcycle accident with injuries.

I do not believe the store kits contain what is needed to properly handle fractures, dislocations, severe bleeding, or other major injuries to a fellow rider or co-rider.

I am presenting this [based] on the 25 years experience as an EMT and this is what I carry on my Gold Wing. Any of the items may be purchased in drug stores, major retail stores (Kmart/ Walmart), or EMS supply.

First and most important in today's medical field of practice is a good set of medical gloves (2 to 3 pair). Always glove up before starting any medical treatment.

A CPR pocket mask is next, providing you protection while performing CPR (level 3/4 REP).

Trauma shears to enable you to cut away clothing, giving you a good visual of the injury site.

Cold packs will help reduce swelling and discomfort of many injuries. Please note that direct application of the cold pack IS NOT RECOMMENDED and should be wrapped in a wash cloth or triangular bandage.

Trauma dressing may be needed for a major bleed. 4x4 dressings, when stacked together may help, but feminine pads work extremely well for trauma dressings and bleeding control due to their good absorption.

Kling is a good means of securing your pressure dressings or other gauze pads.

Triangular bandages (2 to 3). Several rolls of medical tape, hypo allergenic, is recommended. I also carry a bee sting stick and a tube of glucose for diabetic emergency (drug store over the counter products).

A small bottle of sterile water to cool a burn or flush an eye.

Throw in a bottle of antiseptic hand-wash & washcloth for yourself after treatment.

Last but not least is the usual assortment of Band-Aids, 3x3 pads, 4x4 pads.

The nylon bag I put this all in can be found in K-Mart in the fishing dept. It is a 4-compartment nylon bag, one large compartment in the center top and three smaller compartments, one on each side and on the front.

I hope this article will be of help to those of you interested in carrying a first aid kit suited for the type of riding we do and the type of accident we may have on our bikes or we may come across on a ride.

As a PS, I will be teaching FA/CPR at the [NY] District Rally and I am available for classes other times (call/e-mail) and I am also a seminar instructor for Road Captain / Co-Rider.

WE ride for fun, safety and knowledge!

Safety Officer or Rider Educator?

Note that GWRRA does not recognize the term safety officer. If you know of anyone using this term, please help them realize that we call them Rider Educators and it is a position that must be applied for and appointed. At the Chapter level we also refer to the Rider Educator as the Chapter Educator. District Educator is short for District Rider Educator, etc.

I am an Operations Officer. What resources are available to me to learn about and support the Rider Education Program?

As an operations officer, you are responsible for the District or Chapter (as applicable) you are tasked with "Directing". Rider Education is one of those responsibilities. Many understand that this is such an

important life saving task that they need to delegate that responsibility to a staff member - a Rider Educator who can focus all their energy on the subject.

That delegation is not a hand off. You still need to help guide your appointed staff member. If you know little about Rider Ed, how can you effectively monitor the job your Educator is doing for you? The proactive leader can access information available in written form by checking out the Rider Educator Handbook available on the GWRRA website under the Rider Ed Link. There is a handbook available for download or vou can look at the file handbook2000[1].doc or handbook2000.pdf and Handbook-Changes.pdf file on the CD-ROM provided to the District Educators at the meeting and the District Directors after the November Region Staff meetina.

You are not alone though. An entire Division of GWRRA exists to support Rider Education. We are here to help YOU!

<u>District Educators – what can they</u> do for the District Membership?

The answer is more simple than you might think. There is already a list responsibilities for this position:

- Supervise the administration of the Rider Education Program in the District by monitoring the Chapter Educator's activities. (Communication is a must to accomplish this!)
- Promote and participate in activities that will expand the Rider Education Program such as seminars, safety meetings, etc.
- Teach Chapter Educators all aspects of the Rider Education Program so they can implement it at the Chapter level.
- Work closely with the Chapter Directors to enlist their support and co-operation at the Chapter level.
- Provide a newsletter to convey information to the Region Educator and the Chapter Educators within their District. Include relevant articles from the Region and National news. Communicate with Chapter Educators!!!!!!!!

- Provide a Rider Education booth at home District Rally for the purpose of promoting the Rider Education Program.
- Attend Wing Ding and home Region Rally when possible, and assist with the Rider Education Program activities there.
- Assist Chapter Directors, when asked, in selecting their Chapter Educators.
- Make an activity report monthly for distribution to the Region Educator.
- One of the primary responsibilities of the District Educator is to train and assist the Chapter Educators in their District.
- Every Educator has the responsibility to read and learn the program and the process.

To put it in the most basic terms – the District Educator is a communicator that supports the Chapter Educator.

Rider Education participation in the District is reliant on support from Chapter and District Operations and how well the District and Chapter Educators function as a team.

It can be said that the measure of a Chapter Director is how many people show from that Chapter at a monthly meeting, a poker run or rally. We can measure the success of the Educator by a similar means – the enrollment in the Rider Ed Program.

New Seminar - The Art of Braking

This is one of a few a recently developed seminars for the Rider Ed Program that will make its debut at Wing Ding. Don't miss it!

Anyone going to Wing Ding 2003 with us? - Rider Ed Booth

We are looking for volunteers to help us at the Rider Education booth at Wing Ding again this year. Last year went way to fast. It seemed like the day flew by. We were all so busy helping Members we had to be reminded to stop and eat! If you have a Chapter or District Educator, or any GWRRA officer that would like to learn how to fill out Rider Ed Levels applications, now is the time to have them get in touch with us. We would again like to ask for enough people for two hour shifts.

The more the merrier. Contact us if you desire more information. We need to know soon so we can commit the Region's resources for the Rally.

<u>Master Instructor - GWRRA Riding</u> Course Preparation Course

Three applicants were selected for an instructor preparation course at Wing Ding this year. If all goes as planned and with a lot of hard work, we look forward to having yours truly as another Master Instructor in the Northeast Region in July.

Hints on organizing an ERC

Many States are in the middle of a transition from the old to the new MSF ERC suite of courses. The trend of private provider companies is to conduct the Basic Rider Course (BRC) instead of an ERC on a given weekend, since it generates more profit. In addition. Their range had to be repainted to use the new BRC, and it is more difficult to see the old markings on the pavement for the "old" ERC.

Registration for an ERC is typically not a pretty sight, and many are cancelled due to poor turnout. Although rare, those that offer the ERC may additionally limit the students to first timers. The renewals are turned away or placed on a waiting list. It is simply not worth the hassle for many site administrators to advertise and schedule instructors for an ERC.

Our Chapter participants are still in need of a riding course every 24 months to keep current in the Rider Education program at Level II and up. They are increasingly looking to the Educator for help. You can't order an MSF provider to conduct a course.

Not all of the Chapter participants have a trailer or ride a trike, so those GWRRA courses are not going to help them. There are even some Members who think that it is some kind of right owed to them from GWRRA to make the training available! We know that is not true, but we need to do something to keep people interested in the Rider Education Program.

So what can you do as an Educator? First, recommend that they take advantage of the very low

cost ERC courses conducted at rallies like Wing Ding every year. In the Northeast Region, another low cost alternative is at Americade. If these two possibilities are unavailable, coordinate at a Chapter or District Level with an MSF site administrator to set a date when an ERC course could be held that would not interfere with the BRC schedule. Once you have a date, advertise and invite all the GWRRA people you know how to reach to sign up.

Many would rather have an all GWRRA class. If all the registrants are GWRRA, you won't have to bother thinking about the "others" in the class. It just takes a little coordination by you as an Educator along with possible support from an Operations Officer.

If you are lucky enough to have MSF Instructors in your area who are also GWRRA Members, you might be able to negotiate a reduced rate for the Members through volunteer instruction.

What else can you think of?

Sign up NOW! It may soon be too late to get into MSF training for 2003!

Some waiting lists are already into the end of the riding season. Encourage the Membership to look at their 2004 renewal needs now so they are not left out come next January.

CPR/FA Training **upsurge**

We are happy to report that there have been a number of CPR and First Aid courses conducted using the Medic First Aid course in the Northeast Region lately. We know of two conducts in NY, one in PA, in addition to a conformed scheduled course in NY and one in NJ, and potentially another in NY in the near future. We are also scheduling one for the Northeast Region/Delaware District Rally later in the year.

Please take advantage of the numerous volunteers who arranged their own time and transportation plus paid their own money to learn how to teach the Medic First Aid CPR and First Aid program for GWRRA. This makes affordable quality instruction available to the Membership in our Region and beyond.

We are working hard to increase the number of available and certified Seminar presenters, Riding Instructors and quality material to conduct worthwhile training in support of the GWRRA motto – Friends for Fun, SAFETY, and knowledge!

We have worked with the Pins and Patches company to effectively halve the time it has been taking to get your pins and patches to you if we don't already have enough in stock to fill your District orders.

More Districts are building their own supply of pins and patches to meet the demand. The Region supports that inventory providing a slightly lower cost source and saving on shipping charges when possible.

2003 Northeast Region Rider Education **Goals**

• More Instructors for Riding Courses (2 or more)

We have a few volunteers for available Instructor Preparation courses later in the year. We will also potentially be adding an additional Master Instructor to help train even more in 2003.

• More Seminar Instructors See new seminar instructors below.

• Consistent 100% reporting from Districts

January and February are both at 100% This is no small accomplishment since 73% (8 of 11) Districts changed hands in the last 12 months!

• Better Chapter Reporting (one Chapter a month / District improvement where applicable)

We had an increase of 39% in January compared to December 2002. Eight Districts had an increase by one or more Chapters reporting in January. Lets keep up the great work!

More CPR/FA – retain qualified people

20 out of our 26 remaining qualified MFA instructors in the Northeast Region have taught one class in two years to stay certified to teach effective, high quality, low cost CPR/First Aid to our Members.

Rider Ed Table at all Rallies

So far 100% of the District Rallies have had a Rider Ed table getting the word out to the Membership.

Seeing RED - LTD and Rider Education

We need to remind the Membership that all things training are NOT JUST Rider Education. There is another Division that conducts training. It is the Leadership Training Division (LTD). They like to think that they take care of the *Knowledge* portion of the GWRRA motto, whereas we in the Rider Education Division (RED) are accountable for the *Safety* component and the Member Enhancement Division (MED) takes care of the *Fun* part.

Actually we all do a little of each. Sometimes the lines are blurred when Rider Educators become LTD qualified Instructors as well. That is the case in at least two regions that we are aware of – recently including ours.

Please make sure that Rider Education Seminar Instructors you have slated to present at your functions and rallies later this year are currently certified and using the most recent materials. If there are any questions, please contact us.

A certified Seminar Instructor will be issued a GWRRA Rider Education Seminar Instructor card with a number beginning with "SI-" followed by 3 numbers. A certified Rider Education Riding course instructor will have a card number starting with "RC-". Master Instructors cards begin with "MI-" and master Instructor trainers begin with "MIT-".

The former system of instructor numbering started with "B" and "C". These people are no longer certified to teach as of 1/1/03. If you identify any of these previously qualified people left that want to convert to the new certification system, please have them contact us for information. In this way we can better control the consistency and quality of the presentation of materials.

New Jersey District supports the REP!

According to the District Director and verified in the latest newsletter from NJ, the District has agreed to pay for all of the Initial and renewal applications for Rider Ed in the District until the next staff meeting – where continuance will be reevaluated.

Leadership Training

Ending Procrastination- Part II

Last month we viewed procrastination as the opposite of perseverance. This month our objective is to persevere. "It involves using two very powerful principles that foster productivity and perseverance instead of passivity and procrastination. The first principle is: break it down.

No matter what you're trying to accomplish, whether it's writing a book, climbing a mountain, or painting a picture or a house, the key to achievement is your ability to break down the task into manageable pieces and knock them off one at one time.

Focus on accomplishing what's right in front of you at this moment. Ignore what's off in the distance someplace. Substitute real-time positive thinking for negative future visualization. That's the first

all- important technique for bringing an end to procrastination.

Suppose I were to ask you if you could write a four hundred-page novel. If you're like most people, that would sound like an impossible task. But suppose I ask you a different question. Suppose I ask if you can write a page and a quarter a day for one year. Do you think you could do it?

Now the task is starting to seem more manageable. We're breaking down the four-hundred-page book into bite-size pieces. Even so, I suspect many people would still find the prospect intimidating. Do you know why?

Writing a page and a quarter may not seem so bad, but you're being asked to look ahead one whole year. When people start to do look that far ahead, many of them automatically go into a negative mode. So let me formulate the idea of writing a book in yet another way."

"Let me break it down even more. Suppose I was to ask you: can you fill up a page and a quarter with words-not for a year, not for a month, not even for a week, but just today? Don't look any further ahead than that. I believe most people would confidently declare that they could accomplish that.

Of course, these would be the same people who feel totally incapable of writing a whole book.

If I said the same thing to those people tomorrow - if I told them, I don't want you to look back, and I don't want you to look ahead, I just want you to fill up a page and a quarter this very day - do you think they could do it?

One day at a time. We've all heard that phrase. That's what we're doing here. We're breaking down the time required for a major task into one-day segments, and we're doing the work involved in writing a four hundred-page book into page-and-a-quarter increments.

Keep this up for one year, and you'll write the book. Discipline yourself to look neither forward nor backward, and you can accomplish things you never thought you could possibly do. And it all begins with those three words: break it down." We'll discuss the second principle

next month. Let's see if you persevere in the meanwhile.

Public Affairs

May - Motorcycle Awareness
Month is rapidly approaching. This is
a big chance to let the public know
about your favorite motorcycle association and what you do for the
community. Many of us support
charitable organizations or perform
some other community service.
Spend some time reminding yourself
what you have done in the past to
support your community on behalf of
GWRRA. Let the public know about
it.

If you haven't come up with a big list of things already done or in progress, you might consider road side cleanups as a great way to help your community and often get GWRRA's and your Chapter's name up on a sign along that stretch of roadway.

Sometimes we assist at local telethons as volunteers. Many support large national fundraising organizations like the Pediatric Brain Tumor Foundation's Ride for Kids, or the March of Dimes' Bikers for Babies.

Keep in mind that charity begins at home. Take care of the GWRRA membership first, and recognize that your support of fund raisers is optional.

We understand that this can be a sensitive subject, so please caution Chapters about holding fundraising events to support a Charity. While it is undoubtedly for a good cause consider this:

The Membership may not have the resources or time to attend every function for every nearby Chapter. Make sure that the flyer or other advertisement tells potential participants that the proceeds will be going to a particular organization instead of the Chapter if that is the case. Many are willing to support a Chapter, but not the particular charity they are contributing to.

Don't find yourself in this situation: A Chapter decides to support a particular charity. Over time

this turns into holding a fundraiser one or more times a week at nearby car shows or other activities, plus an annual Chapter event to raise additional money for their chosen charity.

Some Chapter participants (often the leader as an officer) soon lose sight of the reason they are a Chapter and become a only a fundraising body. No organized riding occurs because they don't have time. Other Chapters stop coming to their events because they are no longer supporting the Chapter's membership, or have other Chapter events that do support GWRRA Members.

Soon the Chapter needs funds to support itself, and its participants grow increasingly weary of always doing only one thing. The main communications line - the Chapter Newsletter becomes too costly to produce and have available without supporters advertising. All the funds raised are funneled away from the participants and they can't seem to bring themselves to work even harder to support both the Chapter and the charity. The 50/50 winners feel peer pressured into donating their winnings to the Chapter's chosen charity so the participation in that drops considerably as well.

Others have already left the Chapter in search of another where riding, having fun, and learning to be safe are the priority - or left GWRRA altogether. The teamwork and friendships that were developed to support the Chapter initially, that became a charity support mechanism, starts to break down as fingers are pointed to assign blame to those responsible for the Chapter falling apart. Soon there are people leaving GWRRA since it no longer meets their needs. Where is the Friends for Fun, Safety, and Knowledge?

It was not GWRRA or its policies that were the problem here, yet it gets the blame since it was all done in the name of a Chapter of this Association. Do we know as District Directors or Chapter Directors if we have this type of problem locally?

Please plan to get out and communicate with each other on a District and Chapter basis to see if there are any warning signs that might alert you in time to save this type of dying Chapter. Consider what image this presents to the public

about GWRRA.

As with anything else in life, a proper balance needs to be reached. Does GWRRA want Chapters to support charities? Wrong question! – Do the Chapter participants want to support a charity? This is great so long as it is done within the guidelines of the Officers Guidebook and it is done in addition to the needs of the Chapter - when it can be supported.

Project a genuinely happy healthy Chapter of participants who are friends having fun, while learning to ride safer. Simply riding responsibly together and supporting the Rider Education Program puts many CPR and First Aid providers in the community.

If we can support more, that is great too. We sometimes fail to see that we are all ambassadors to motorcycling and GWRRA at all times on our Gold Wings, Valkyries, Trikes, and other motorcycles. Your attitude is infectious – is yours worth catching?!
